

## **EXPERT GUEST LECTURER**



Walter Englert is the Omar and Althea Hoskins Professor of Classics and Humanities, Emeritus at Reed College. He received his B.A. in Classics from St. Mary's College of California, his M.A. in Classics from UC Santa Barbara, and his Ph.D. in Classics from Stanford University. At Reed he taught Humanities 110, courses in Greek and Latin, and courses on Greek Tragedy, Classical Mythology, and Ancient Philosophy. He has also taught at the University of Michigan, UC Berkeley, and at the Intercollegiate Center for Classical Studies in Rome. He has published books and articles on Hellenistic and Roman philosophy, and a translation of Lucretius' On the Nature of Things (Focus, 2003). He led a previous Reed Alumni Trip to Greece in 2006.

Thursday, October 1, 2020

#### **DEPART THE USA**

Depart from the US for Athens, Greece.

#### Friday, October 2

#### **ATHENS. Greece**

Arrive in Athens and transfer to the Athens Plaza Hotel, located on Constitution Square, the center of the city and near historic attractions and the shopping district. In the evening, enjoy a welcome dinner at a restaurant.

#### Saturday, October 3

#### **ATHENS**

Athens's ancient monuments attest to its glorious past. Visit in the morning the Acropolis and its celebrated monuments, including the incomparable Parthenon and other temples and structures built in the 5th century BC. Visit the Acropolis Museum, which houses an outstanding collection of sculptures and other artifacts. Spend the afternoon at leisure for independent activities.

#### Sunday, October 4

#### ATHENS / MYCENAE / EPIDAURUS / **NAFPLION / ATHENS**

Leave Athens for the day to explore the Peloponnese, the southern part of Greece. After driving over the Corinth Canal, the narrow waterway that separates the Peloponnese from the Greek mainland, stop at Mycenae, the

most important center of the Mycenaean civilization that flourished during the Bronze Age (second millennium BC), and home of Agamemnon, the Greek leader of the fabled Trojan War. Continue to Epidaurus, the shrine dedicated to Aesculapius, the god of healing. The site is famous for its incredible 4th-century BC theater, known for its perfect acoustics and harmonious proportions. Enjoy lunch and time at leisure in Nafplion, a lovely medieval town, situated at the head of a spacious bay and crowned by two fortresses. Discover the town's narrow streets and graceful squares. Return to Athens in the late afternoon.

#### Monday, October 5

#### ATHENS / SOUNION / ATHENS

In the morning visit the splendid Benaki Museum, formerly a private collection, whose exhibits chronicle the rich heritage of Greek cultures. After time at leisure. In the afternoon, drive along the shore of the Athenian Riviera to Sounion to visit the Temple of Poseidon, magnificently set above the sea. The English poet Lord Byron was a visitor and an admirer of the site. Sunset observed from Sounion is spectacular. Enjoy dinner at a local restaurant before returning to the hotel.



#### Tuesday, October 6


#### ATHENS / DELPHI / ATHENS

Leave Athens in the morning for Delphi, passing on the way through the traditional village of Arachova. One of the most impressive sites in

Greece, Delphi stands on high ground and is surrounded by towering mountains split by a ravine. This place of savage beauty has been sacred from the earliest times. Steam and fumes emerge from cracks and crannies in the rocks giving the region an awesome majesty that perhaps inspired the building of the fabled shrines starting in the 7th century BC. Here, a priestess would render the oracles to those anxious to know the future. Explore the site, including the Sacred Way, the Treasury of the Athenians and the Temple of Apollo. Also, visit the Museum, which houses the famous bronze

# Wednesday, October 7 ATHENS / PAROS

This morning take a short flight to Paros. On arrival, transfer to the *Hotel Paros Bay*, located near the beach. One of the loveliest of the Greek islands, situated in the middle of the Aegean Sea, Paros is known for its characteristic white-washed architecture, serene landscape, old villages and chapels, picturesque fishing harbors and inviting beaches and coves. It is also the source of one of the world's finest marble, favored by the greatest sculptors of antiquity. Enjoy dinner at an island taverna.

#### Thursday, October 8

#### PAROS / SANTORINI / PAROS

Leave Paros in the morning to cruise in the blue Aegean Sea to Santorini, perhaps the most spectacular island in the Mediterranean. Be on deck as the ship approaches the island to admire the impressive volcanic landscape and the island's main town, Phira, perched on the 1,000-foot-high caldera. In the Bronze Age, the island was a flourishing trading center inhabited by a sophisticated society. In the late 17th century BC, a massive volcanic eruption collapsed half of the island and buried its main town in a thick layer of ash and pumice, preserving its houses, streets and squares as they existed 3,700 years ago. Today, the site, called Akrotiri, is one of the world's most important archaeological sites. We will visit

Akrotiri upon arrival, and also have time to explore Phira and marvel at the incredible views. Lunch at a restaurant specializing in the cuisine of the island.

Friday, October 9

#### PAROS / DELOS / MYKONOS / PAROS

Sail to small and uninhabited Delos, the island that was sacred to ancient Greeks on account of its being the birthplace of the divine twins Apollo and Artemis. A UNESCO World Heritage Site, Delos is a vast archaeological site and a veritable open air museum. After exploring

Delos, sail to nearby Mykonos, the quintessential Cycladic island, known for its cosmopolitan atmosphere and smart shops and cafes. Enjoy lunch in Mykonos and spend time at leisure to discover Mykonos on your own before sailing back to Paros.

# Saturday, October 10 PAROS / ATHENS

Today, we will explore Paros, starting in Parikia, the island's atmospheric main town, where we visit the church of Ekatontapyliani ("One-Hundred Gated"), the most important

early Christian church in the Greek islands, and a place of worship for over 1,700 years, dedicated to the Dormition of the Virgin. Continue to the island's interior, passing by the ancient marble quarries, to Lefkes, a picturesque village, and Naoussa, an old fishing village, now a fashionable resort, built around a small charming harbor. In the late afternoon fly to Athens and transfer to the Sofitel Athens Airport hotel for our final night, including a festive farewell dinner.
